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




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Five ways to practice self-care over spring break

Shamrockin' ways to celebrate St. Patrick's Day

St. Patrick's Day is a holiday that often goes unnoticed, but in Tampa, there are many festivities to celebrate it. Tampa Bay will be bringing back a pre-pandemic tradition this year and coloring the Hillsborough River a kelly green, and bars across the city will host events and a bar crawl.

Since 2011, the city of Tampa dyed the Hillsborough River green for the River O' Green Fest. This tradition came to a pause

over the past two years due to the pandemic, according to News Channel 8.

The River O' Green Fest is taking place March 12 from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Curtis Hixon Waterfront Park. The event is free and includes live entertainment, food and beverage vendors, beer and family-friendly activities, according to the River O' Green website.

Tampa residents and guests can also go paddling on the River Green. The paddle is free if attendees bring their own board, but gear rental, such as boards and paddles, is available for \$40 and up. Reservations can be made at Urbain Kai and it includes gear and a tour guide.

A Pirate Water Taxi, which is a pirate-themed boat ride on

the Hillsborough River, will also be available throughout the day along the Riverwalk. Adult tickets are \$25 and kids are \$15.

Also, along the green river will be the ShamROCK Fest on the Riverwalk. This event is happening March 12 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Music by Tom Petty and Guns N' Roses tribute bands will be featured. There will also be Irish step dance performances, a magician, leprechauns as well as Irish food and drink specials.

There is no age requirement to attend the ShamROCK Fest, but attendees 12 and up need to purchase a ticket for \$10 online. VIP tickets are also available for attendees over 21 starting at \$55, which includes complimentary drinks, private bathrooms, snacks, shade and comfortable

furniture throughout the event.

Lucky's fifth annual St. Patrick's Day Crawl is happening March 19 from 4-11:59 p.m. The event is expecting 2,500 people to attend, according to Visit Tampa Bay's website.

The event will include costume contest, complimentary drinks or shots, exclusive drink specials, a custom lucky badge and lanyard as well as waived cover at all venues.

Tickets are available for \$20 per person in a group or \$25 for a single ticket on the website.

Rough Riders St. Patrick's Day Parade will continue its 40-plus year annual tradition paying homage to former President Theodore Roosevelt's St. Patrick's Day celebrations. The parade is held on the Saturday before

St. Patrick's Day in Ybor City, according to the Tampa Bay

Attendees can take a streetcar from downtown from the River O' Green Fest to Ybor City for the parade.



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

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Statistics behind the fun: Why tourism booms over spring break

Dating back to ancient Greece when it was a festival dedicated to Dionysus, the god of wine and debauchery, spring break has long been a time of letting go. Today, it has morphed into a rite of passage for college students, involving traveling and partying.

Approximately one-anda-half million students travel annually during spring break, according to TravelMarket Report, making it a period with more intensive travel than throughout the rest of the year. An estimated 37% of Americans are traveling this spring, according to Business Wire, which is a significant increase from the 29% in spring 2021. Of these travelers, 75% are planning to stay in the U.S. as opposed to traveling abroad.

In general, tropical beaches are the prime target of spring break travelers, with many of the most popular spring break destinations located in Florida, including Miami, Fort Lauderdale, Orlando, Fort Myers and Tampa.

Spring break is also associated with economic impacts, both negative and positive. The tourism industry, before the pandemic, accounted for approximately 10% of global jobs and had a 10.4% of global GDP (\$9.2 trillion), according to the World Travel & Tourism Council. In 2020, it decreased

to 5.5% of global GDP, and 62 million jobs were lost.

The tourism industry is expected to rebound this year, said the New York Times, as greater numbers of Americans make plans to travel. However, the "spring break effect" — the influence spring break has on local economies — is not particularly influential.

Many college students, with their limited funds, tend to avoid any expensive products or services that would contribute more significantly to the local economy. They book less-expensive hotel rooms and pack more people into one room, buy cheaper alcohol and limit their excursions to the beach.

While small businesses, mostly in the profession of selling cheap alcohol, may benefit from college students' patronage, law enforcement is the only business consistently impacted by spring break. Over spring break, the police are called more often and crime rates increase, which burdens the local economy, according to The Atlantic.

Panama Beach City, labeled the "spring break capital of the world," experiences a significant increase in crimes in the month of March, according to The Atlantic. From 2001-05, the city ranged from 65-130 cases of criminal activity per month before spiking to an average of 290 crimes in February and 187 and March.

Alcohol is another defining factor for the traditional spring break. While other festivities such as Christmas and Thanksgiving are known for cookies or turkey, spring break is often criticized and praised for the pure amount of alcohol consumed.

Over spring break, 44% of female college students and 75% of male students will drink on a daily basis, according to American Addiction Centers. Men consume an average of 18 alcoholic beverages daily, with women drinking up to 10.

Certain demographics also tend to underestimate how much they are drinking, including male students, those associated with fraternities or sororities and those encouraged by their friends.

St. Patrick's day, falling on March 17 this year, is another important day for drinking, according to Insider. It's the fourth most popular day to drink — following Christmas, New Year's and the Fourth of July. An estimated 13 million pints of Guinness are served.

There are several amenities


near the beach, including tennis and volleyball courts, playgrounds, picnic areas and pavilions.
